Make Memories with ADHD

Research shows that individuals with ADHD are four times more likely to have working memory problems compared to peers without attention problems. The term working memory describes the ability to hold in mind and use information over short periods of time.

Working memory is also thought of as the mental workspace that we use to store information while performing tasks. This skill is important when trying to add numbers together, such as $23 + 16 + 12$; when following multi-step instructions, “Go upstairs, brush your teeth, comb your hair, bring your homework downstairs;” or when grocery shopping, “I need eggs, milk, potatoes, bread, and toilet paper.” [Read more.](#)
